III. CPS Annual Programs

For the 2015 CPS program we put out a call for participants in the fall of 2014 asking for proposals that targeted undergraduate students and spoke to the theme of collaboration beyond our East Asian collections. We got a number of proposals, which were then vetted by the committee and the selected presenters were offered constructive comments to help them to refine their presentations further. In some cases, people who put in similar proposals decided to collaborate and co-present in order to provide a more coherent overview of their topics.

We have also encouraged the presenters to revise and submit their presentations in a written format in JEAL as a way of furthering their research and sharing their knowledge more broadly. The 2015 program is:

Another idea that we will be considering is using the new possibilities of Google Hangout to allow for more conversation and information sharing among public service librarians on a regular basis. This would allow us to see each other's faces and share more information than is currently possible during 2 or 3 days of CEAL and the rarely used eastlib listserv.
